

**Aerial Maps  
Completed In  
18 Counties**

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Aerial photographs to be used in mapping farm land have been completed in 18 counties, C. C. Randall, assistant director of the state Agricultural Extension Service, said yesterday. Portions of 14 additional counties have been photographed, and work in 11 more is scheduled for early completion.

They will be used in checking performance of farmers in the 1937 agricultural conservation program. Maps of 12,165 farms have been completed.

More than 108,050 work sheets have been approved, and about 1,500 more remain to be audited. The work has been completed in 40 counties.

Aerial photographs have been completed in Bradley, Calhoun, Chicot, Clark, Columbia, Crittenden, Desha, Faulkner, Jefferson, Lafayette, Lonoke, Miller, Mississippi, Ouachita, Pulaski, Union and White counties. Photographs are to be made soon in Ashley, Conway, Drew, Hempstead, Jackson, Lincoln, Little River, Logan, Monroe, Nevada, Pope, Prairie and Woodruff counties.

**Likely Reservoir Sites  
Being Mapped.**

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Aerial photographs are being made of proposed flood control reservoir sites in Arkansas and Oklahoma by Lieut. K. M. Landon, United States Army Air Corps, who is stationed at Scott Field, near Belleville, Ill., Capt. D. W. Griffiths, executive officer of the Little Rock District Army Engineers, said yesterday.

Maps of the proposed projects will be made from the photographs by the new multiplex mapping system, which will facilitate the engineers' map-making task, Captain Griffiths said. Lieutenant Landon, assisted by two sergeants, will spend two weeks in the two states.
